E: THE EIGHTEENTH CENTURY

FRANZ LEHAR

The Composer of the Music of "Gipsy Love"

...was born in Komarom, Hungary, in 1870. He studied at the Prague Conservatory. Began conducting in 1890 and in 1892 was appointed Conductor at the Theatre-an-der-Wien in Vienna. Devoting himself later to composing. He has become one of the most famous operetta composers of our time.

Lehar's music is a model of what good operetta writing should be. It is full of buoyant melodies that are assimilated at first hearing, and are then not easily forgotten. He boasts a lightness of touch, a grace of style, a light heartedness that makes his music an eloquent expression of the Viennese spirit. It is astutely orchestrated, and above everything else it has a perpetual freshness and spontaneity that give it engaging charm.

The story of "Gipsy Love" unfolds in Rural England. The First Act is set in the Garden of Plomley Place, the residence of Sir Peregrine Plomley. A betrothal party is in progress, celebrating the engagement of Sir Peregine's elder daughter "Miranda" to the son of the Lord Lieutenant of the County, "Lawrence." However Miranda has an infatuation for "Antonio" a Gipsy vagabond, who has a way with the ladies, and is encamped with the roving Gipsy band on Sir Peregine's land. Miranda cannot bring herself to live a lifetime with Lawrence, whom she loves and respects, and elopes with Antonio.

Act II is located in front of "The Romany Rye" a country tavern, frequented by the Gipsy band. The Gipsies are very much in evidence when the Gentry, who are out looking for Miranda, arrive at the inn but cannot prevail on the Gipsies to betray the whereabouts of Antonio and Miranda, who by this time has been disallusioned with the Gipsy way of life and Antonio who does not seem at all anxious to marry Miranda in her church.

Lord Lyall, Lawrence's father, forces "Ria" the Gipsy Queen to instruct Antonio to turn from Miranda, to ensure her return to her family and Lawrence.

Act III opens back at Plomley Place, in the ballroom. Miranda has come to her senses, and she and Lawrence are reunited. Apart from the romantic interest, some fine comedy between Sir Peregrine and Lady Phoebe, a wealthy widow, who Sir P. hopes to marry to recoup his family fortune. Lucinda, Miranda's younger sister and the Mayor's son Oswald Oliphant, also provide some delightful comedy.
