


DIRECTOR

ark's musical theatre experience spans over fifty years and one hundred productions. Starting as a young performer, he progressed through his theatrical apprenticeship in the roles of stage crew, lighting assistant, repetiteur, orchestral player and finally director and musical director.

For many years Mark was heavily involved in the New Zealand musical theatre scene. His major credits include Fiddler on the Roof, Barnum (with Rob Guest), Kiss Me Kate, Evita, Les Misérables, Rush! (a world premiere), Little Shop of Horrors and West Side Story. Since moving to Brisbane in 2000, Mark has been invited back to New Zealand twice to conduct Encore, a 75th Jubilee production, and Beauty and the Beast.

Mark was a founder of PRIMA on the Northside and has musically directed Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Grease, Dreamcoat, Annie, Little Shop Nunsense, of Horrors, Jesus Christ Superstar, Nuncrackers and Hairspray along with five theatre restaurants to date.

MARK BEILBY MUSICAL DIRECTOR

When the animated feature film of Beauty and the Beast was first released, critics immediately praised its songs as worthy of a Broadway musical. Beauty and the Beast went on to win Academy Awards for Best Song and Best Original Score and made history as the first animated feature ever nominated for a Best Picture Oscar.

The music was composed by Alan Menken with lyrics by Howard Ashman and Tim Rice. Ashman wrote all the lyrics for the original film but unfortunately died eight months prior to its release. Tim Rice was brought in to work on the stage musical and provided the lyrics for 9 new songs.

Beauty and the Beast is a more "traditional" musical in that the songs not only serve to assist in character development, but help to move the story onwards. As with all good stories, the audience needs to become so acquainted with the individual characters that they become concerned with what happens to them. The music is integral in this process.

As well as the many beautiful songs, the work is heavily underscored throughout, helping to build the drama or lighten the atmosphere. This makes for an extremely busy time in the orchestra pit! For this production we have opted for the full 19-piece orchestration to do justice to the symphonic sound of this beautiful score.

From the reflective yearning of "Home" to the powerful angst-ridden "If I Can't Love Her", the dazzling company production numbers including "Be Our Guest", and of course the beloved title song, this show has something musical for all ages. The cast have worked so hard to present this wonderful show to you tonight. I know you will appreciate their effort and the humour, adventure and romance that is Beauty and the Beast. And if you don't go home humming at least one tune, I'll eat my baton!





Synopsis



once upon a time there lived a young Prince who was spoiled, selfish and unkind. But then one winter's night, an old Beggar Woman requested shelter in the Prince's castle in return for a single red rose. Repulsed by her haggard appearance the Prince dismissed her only to find she was a beautiful Enchantress in disguise. The Prince tried to apologise, but it was too late, for she had seen that there was no love in his heart. As punishment, she transformed him into a hideous Beast and placing a powerful spell on the castle and all who lived there. The Enchantress left him the rose and a magic mirror as a window to the outside world. If the Prince did not learn to love another, and earn another's love in return before the last rose petal fell, the spell would stay unbroken, and he would remain a Beast forever.

In a quaint French village lives the beautiful, intelligent Belle and her father Maurice, an eccentric inventor. Belle loves books and the villagers watch her, curiously commenting on her individuality ("Belle"). One of the most popular citizens, Gaston, has decided to marry Belle but she avoids his advances and heads home, finding Maurice working on one of his inventions. She can't help but wonder if they are odd but Maurice assures his daughter they are special, and have each other ("No Matter What"). Maurice heads off to the fair singing ("No Matter What - Reprise") but is attacked by a pack of ferocious wolves. Maurice escapes by entering a creepy, old castle.

Once inside, Maurice discovers to his amazement that the whole manor is populated with enchanted objects. Lumière, a charming candelabra, Cogsworth, a tightly-wound mantle clock, and Mrs Potts, a sweet maternal teapot try to make Maurice feel more comfortable. However, the Beast bursts into the room and, roaring at Maurice for intruding, mercilessly throws the old man into the dungeon.

Outside Belle's cottage, Gaston paints Belle a vivid picture of what their married life could be, highlighting his own significance in their masculine household. ("Me"). Belle rejects his offer of marriage and contemplates what she really wants in life ("Belle - Reprise"). Lefou appears

looking for Gaston, wearing the scarf Belle gave to Maurice for good luck. He confesses that he found it in the woods so she races off to find her dear father. Belle enters the castle, searching for Maurice. Seeing Belle, Lumière and Cogsworth's hopes are again ignited that the spell might be broken. Belle finds her father in a dungeon cell and begs the Beast to let her father go. When he does not relent, she offers to become the Beast's prisoner in exchange for her father's freedom. The Beast accepts her offer and leads Belle to nicer quarters, strictly forbidding her to entering the West Wing. Alone again, Belle mourns the loss of her father and her freedom ("Is This Home?"). Mrs Potts, with Madame de la Grande Bouche, try to convince Belle to give the Beast a chance ("Is This Home? - Reprise").

Inside the tavern, Lefou and some of the villagers rouse Gaston's spirits by reminding him of how admired he is ("Gaston"). The ploy works and Gaston joins in the merriment. Maurice enters, frantically begging for help to rescue Belle from the monstrous Beast. As usual, no one takes "crazy old Maurice" seriously, but Maurice's rant gives Gaston a new idea ("Gaston - Reprise"). He will threaten to have Maurice committed to a lunatic asylum unless Belle agrees to marry him.

At the castle, the Beast anxiously awaits Belle at dinner but Belle remains defiant, so the Beast forbids her to dine alone. He retreats to the West Wing and reflects on his mistakes ("How Long Must This Go On?"). Meanwhile, Belle feels hungry and sneaks out to the kitchen, where she finds Cogsworth and Mrs Potts who insists on feeding the poor girl. Lumière declares that with a proper dinner comes a little music, and leads all the objects through a spectacular feast and floor show ("Be Our Guest"). Belle is thrilled by this magical dinner party and proceeds on a tour through the castle with Cogsworth and Lumière. She soon slips away and makes her way to the forbidden West Wing. She discovers the enchanted rose and as she is about to touch it, the Beast emerges and bellows at her to stay away. She is so frightened that she breaks her promise and bolts from the castle. Realising what he has done, he mourns her departure and his own shrinking humanity ("If I Can't Love Her").



ACT 2

n the woods, Belle is surrounded by a pack of ferocious wolves but the Beast heroically appears and fights them off but is badly injured. Belle decided to help her wounded rescuer, returning to the castle to tend his wounds. Belle warms to the Beast which surprises him and the castle servants ("Something There"). The Beast wants to give Belle a token of his affection, presenting her with his massive and neglected library. She suggests they read "King Arthur" together and spend the entire day reading the story after which Belle invites the Beast to join her for dinner. The servants raise their hopes that Belle will help their master break the spell and return to their former selves ("Human Again").

Meanwhile, Gaston and Lefou meet with Monsieur D'Arque, the slimy, calculating proprietor of the local lunatic asylum. Gaston explains his plan to blackmail Belle and Monsieur D'Arque agrees to help them ("Maison des Lunes").

In the West Wing, Lumière and Cogsworth prepare the Beast for dinner and encourage him to confess his love for Belle. They enjoy a romantic dinner together, dancing as Mrs Potts sings of their unique relationship ("Beauty And The Beast"). The Beast notices Belle is troubled. She admits she is worried about Maurice. The Beast offers his magic mirror so that she may see Maurice again. When she looks in the mirror, she sees Maurice is lost in the woods. The Beast insists she go to him and take the mirror so that she can always look back. Mrs Potts realises that he has learned to love at last. However, they feel it is too late for the spell to be broken, as Belle must love him in return ("If I Can't

Belle finds Maurice and they return home with Belle explaining the Beast's true intentions, ("A Change In Me"). Monsieur D'Arque and a mob arrive to take Maurice away. Belle grabs the mirror to prove to the mob that the Beast is real, and that her father is not crazy. Gaston whips the townsfolk into a frenzy by convincing them the Beast is a threat and must be killed ("The Mob Song"). Belle and Maurice hurry off to warn him.

When the mob reaches the castle, a battle begins. They are driven back but


Gaston remains to kill the Beast. Without the heart to fight, the Beast endures the merciless attacks, until he realises that Belle has returned. Gaston stabs the Beast in the back but then loses balance and falls to his death. Dying from his wounds, the Beast tells the weeping Belle that he is happy to see her one last time. Belle utters that she loves him as the last rose petal falls. Suddenly, the Enchantress appears, and the Beast magically transforms back into the handsome Prince. They embrace as all the servants are transformed back into their human forms, rejoicing that the spell has been broken. The entire company sings ("Beauty And The Beast - Reprise") as the Prince and his beauty prepare to

live happily ever after.

PATRICK OXLEY | THE BEAST

atrick's career in musical theatre began in 1983, performing the title role in Oliver!. Working extensively in Canberra and around the country since then, Patrick has performed in numerous productions including: The Mikado, Fiddler on the Roof, South Pacific, HMS Pinafore, The Pirates of Penzance, The Yeomen of the Guard, Grease, You're a Good Man Charlie Brown, Anything Goes and Les Misérables.

In 1997 Patrick went to the United Kingdom where he performed *Cabaret* for two years. Patrick's versatility as a performer is evidenced by his extensive work in clubs and public venues around Australia and the UK as lead singer in a variety of genres and bands.

Patrick received a Canberra Area Theatre Award for Best Actor for his portrayal of Jesus in *Jesus Christ Superstar* (2001). Since then he has played other leading roles including Beadle Bamford in *Sweeney Todd* and Jim Haller in *All Shook Up* for The Gold Coast Arts Centre, the Narrator in *Blood Brothers*, alternate Phantom in the *The Phantom of the Opera* for Savoyards and most recently the role of Old Deuteronomy in Harvest Rain's production of *Cats* at the Brisbane Convention Centre.

Patrick completed his formal studies in 2002 with a Diploma of Music in Voice. He has continued to study voice and acting, most recently opera with Spanish tenor Rafael Soler. Patrick is in demand as a soloist, performing many recitals and concerts around the country with leading orchestras and his voice has featured on a number of commercially produced recordings.




TRISTAN HAM | MONSIEUR D'ARQUE




