

Cur Woes in Waltztime



Franz Lehar, Hungarian born composer, has written an operetta concerning our quest to keep the Glavari millions within the realm of Pontevedro.

Franz was born, the son of a Bandmaster in the imperial Austrian army in Komaron, Hungary on April 30th 1870. His parents encouraged him to study music and by the age of 12 he had won a scholarship to the Prague Music Academy where he studied for 6 years. Dvorak, the eminent Czech composer, told him to "hang up your fiddle, and concentrate on composing music", as also did Brahms. After a year as first violinist in a small German theatre, he followed his father into the Austrian army as Bandmaster at the age of 20, the youngest ever appointed.

The pull of the theatre eventually won out and the success of Lehar's realistic opera "Kukuscha", followed by two operettas, "Viennese Women" and "The Tinker", sealed the direction of his composing career.

We are certain "The Merry Widow" on which he worked with fine librettists Victor Leon and Leo Stein, will prove his most brilliant and sparkling success. His wonderful melodies in waltz time so entrancing, as well as polkas, mazurkas and marching songs, reflect his Slavic and Austrian background, leavened with the sparkle of a heady French champagne.

Madame Zelda Sees All:

Madame Zelda predicts a big future for Franz Lehar. He will go on to write many more opererettas and though none will be as famous as 'The Merry Widow' he will long be remembered as the composer who returned viennese operetta to centre stage. I see an operetta named "Land of Smiles" in the future and a tenor called Richard Tauber. Be on the lookout toofor an operetta about the Count of Luxembourg.



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

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




DID YOU KNOW?
