THE DIRECTOR.

When I heard that the 'SAVS' were doing a production number on 'SEVEN BRIDES FOR SEVEN BROTHERS', I thought I might throw my hat into the ring. It just happens I'm one of those strange creatures who was weaned on the 'Golden Years Of Hollywood' and in particular those great movie musicals I came to love.

'SEVEN BRIDES' was shot on the back-lots of MGM studios against sundry painted drops and became an instant success story. Critics mused as critics will, that it was a musical mutation. However theatre audiences took this 'modest little movie' to their hearts, and adored its charm, its innocence, its good honest entertainment, its simplicity and it is this which I have adopted as the key-note of this production - simplicity!

'SEVEN BRIDES FOR SEVEN BROTHERS' is NOT a big musical and cannot rate beside heavy weights contemporaries as 'OKLAHOMA', 'ANNIE GET YOUR GUN' or 'PAINT YOUR WAGON'. It suffered on Broadway, closing after two weeks because they tried to kick it into something it was not. They went for glitz, glamour and bounce, and paid the price for avoiding the 'simplistic charm' the movie generated.

The SAVOYARDS have not the resources to accredit x-million dollars of glitz, glamour and bounce to stage a big dollar production as in the mumbo-jumbo land of professional show-biz. It is a somewhat David and Goliath situation, the impossible challenge. However there is always the chance of a well placed sling shot hitting its mark. The trick is to hit the spot. The name of the game is survival by blood, sweat and tears. It is about commitment, it is about reducing the odds, it is about guts and determination, it is what money can't bye - honestly.

I congratulate the SAVOYARDS MUSICAL COMEDY SOCIETY for their brave choice to campaign 'SEVEN BRIDES', and extending me the opportunity to work with an excellent production crew and a wonderful cast I am proud to see take the stage under my direction.

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STORY LINE.

SEVEN BRIDES FOR SEVEN BROTHERS is more like 'Snow White' revisited. Instead of our heroine encountering dwarfs, she is lumbered with seven dirty, almost sub-human brothers.

It's Oregon and God-fearing territory. Mountain man, ADAM PONTIPEE comes to town to trade beaver - n'lookin' fer a wife. (BLESS YOUR BEAUTIFUL HIDE) He meets and - in almost the same breath - marries MILLY, the only - unspoken gal in town.

After the wedding (WONDERFUL, WONDERFUL DAY) Adam takes Milly to his mountain home. She is horrified to discover she has to wash, cook, mend, "n' tend the hogs." for six ornery backwoodsman brothers. Milly nearly takes flight but decides to stay with her 'ONE MAN' to bring about - as in all good folk yarns - a transformation in the brief space of one song (GOIN' COURTIN')

"Where do they hale from you suppose?" says one pretty girl at the Barn Raising Social. "Heaven!" says another.
As in all good love stories - six brothers and the six girls (BRIDES) are smitten at first sight - but the town boys (SUITORS) are not impressed and they challenge the brothers in a spirited dance when they vie for the attention of the girls, (SOCIAL DANCE) which ends in a big fight. The brothers win - of course - but loose the girls.
The brothers fall into an extreme case of the mopes. ('LOVE NEVER GOES AWAY') Adam tells them "Why don't you do like them Romans

GOES AWAY') Adam tells them "Why don't you do like them Romans did with them Sobbin' Wimmin'. they up n'carried 'em off!" (SOBBIN' WOMEN) So the motivation into Act II is hatched just as the curtain falls.

Moving along quickly now - as in all good musicals - the brothers 'kidnap' their gals and escape the wrath of the TOWNSFOLK by causing an avalanche at Echo Pass - "Oh no, not Echo Pass!", and wouldn't you know it? "There's no ways in and there's no ways out 'til winter thaw - oh those poor little dears..."
Milly is furious at what has happened, and - as in all good domestic comedies - husband and wife become estranged. Adam goes off in a pout. (A WOMAN OUGHT TO KNOW HER PLACE) While Milly and girls settle down to a long, long winter. Outside in the cold, the brothers fuss about (WE GOTTA MAKE IT THROUGH THE WINTER).

Just for variety, Milly has a baby - (GLAD THAT YOU WERE BORN) while Adam - living out the winter on mountain moonshine and smoked racoon with only his hoss for company - is visited by youngest brother GIDEON. He tells Adam the wonderful news that spring love is simply running rampant back on the farm. girls and six brothers have at last got it all together - did you doubt it? (SPRING DANCE). Gideon also tells Adam about the baby. Adam doesn't believe him - so Gideon slugs him - pretty rivetting stuff. Adam later returns home and love triumph over all. Adam, Milly - and baby makes three - are reunited. As in all good westerns - with the pass open, the Suitors and the Townspeople are fair bustin' for a hanging. This grizzly deed is averted when the pastor hears a baby cry and asks the girls in a tremulous voice, "Who's is it?", and the girls answer - Arh, but that would be giving away the ending. Surfice to say - as in all good fairy tales - seven brides for seven brothers live happerly

ever after.




Dear Friends,
